Reflection: A sad song of Samson

Samson is the figurehead for the next two weeks. When I was a kid, I loved Sunday school stories about Samson. I thought it was cool to go to church and hear about a really strong guy who fought a lot.

I remember learning about the source of Samson's strength: his long hair. I also learned he was one of the Old Testament judges of Israel, and that he definitely liked the ladies a lot. My early reading introduced me to this superhero – an ordinary man who received supernatural strength from the one true God, with the purpose of bringing hope and freedom to God's people who were being crushed underneath an oppressive government.

This is the Samson of Sunday school. When I got older, I read Judges 13-16 — I started to see another image of Samson — He was markedly different from my Arnold Shwatznegger — 'I'll be back' film star. My rereading of Judges 13-16 introduced me to another Samson - a man who though had lots of physical strength — maybe a giant — but was also morally weak and vulnerable.

He was also a man whose 'weakness was turned to lots of strength' because of his faith in God. God used him for great acts of deliverance, and it is understandable that he became a great hero to the Jewish people and nation. Samson was an example of a great and faithful servant of God; in whom they saw God's Spirit work to do great things.

However, the more we delve into his story we cannot escape the fact that should we encounter a person such as Samson today in our churches, and even in society, we would be quick to brand him an absolute rogue. That is the dilemma of some of the famous characters of the Bible.

Although held up as figures of faith, yes, from whom we might learn about some aspects of life, we are not necessarily to emulate their way of life – like Solomon – a man believed to have great wisdom – but arguably a poor sense of judgement – involving gathering around himself 700 wives and 300 mistresses.

Likewise, Samson was a man of tremendous physique! But his exploits include evils we struggle with today – abuse of women, violence and annihilation of human and animal life beyond measure. Samson is someone who seems to have been handed power and, like many leaders of the world throughout history and in the present, has used that power opportunistically, randomly and often for self-gain.

Samson here, and particularly elsewhere, comes across as someone disrespectful of women. The power he has, is used to get/take whatever he wants. We say this is unacceptable, but recent cases of the misuse of power in the area of gender equality within the workplace, politics, film and TV, remind us that this kind of abusive behaviour still goes on.

The exciting thing about Samson is he is a man who is easy to understand. It's easy to read about men like David and Abraham and Moses and the incredible things they did and to think to yourself, "I could never be like them because they were extraordinary human beings. Not so with Samson – in fact one of the good things about Samson's story is that he is not presented as a special saint. He belongs here, with the regular people (or maybe with the irregular people – we know well).

We've seen his beginning—how he had it all. Then, right out of the gate, he begins to make mistakes. Not just one – but many mistakes. We read in Judges 14 about the Samson's multiplied mistakes:

- He went to the wrong place.
- · He was looking for the wrong thing.
- He rejected Godly counsel.
- He continued a wrong relationship.

Samson is one of these tragic, flawed, characters of the Bible. He is not edited out of the Bible – He is there – that is the beauty of this book – it is not just about stories of the good people – but also of ordinary people like Samson. Samson is power-hungry and obsessive and ruthless in what he takes from the world through his power. At the same time, he is weak and vulnerable as the quick wittedness of his female companions reveals, as they uncover his secrets.

Samson is all too human a being and provides a lesson for us about the misuse of power and ill-treatment of others that we as humans must avoid in order to be part of God's vision for community. But even in his limitedness, in his humanity – he is not a man, a vessel that God will not use...

Oh Lord, our Lord, how majestic is your name. For the people of Tigray, Ethiopia; for the people of Madagascar. We praise you for the gift of those who look beyond themselves.

Lord, Creator of the world, we pray for the peoples of Afghanistan as conflict fills their world. We pray especially for the vulnerable, those poor, unable to find work and the children. We praise you for the peaceable, the peacemakers, and peacekeepers however difficult their work becomes.
