OPENING PRAYER LORD'S PRAYER

BRIEF REFLECTION (part of a reflection shared by Rev Dr Martin Fair, Moderator of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland)

If you travel to Torridon in the North West Highlands of Scotland, you'll have opportunity to marvel at what are some of Scotland's most magnificent mountain landscapes. The rock of which these mountains are composed is the oldest in the country and some of the oldest on the face of the earth. It's somewhat humbling – and helps to keep everything in perspective – to step on these rocks and in so doing to be aware of one's own smallness and, as some would have it, insignificance in the big scheme of things.

And yet in the psalm we have this:

'Before the mountains were born, from beginning to end, You are God.'

The point is this, that God stands above and beyond all that we see and all that there ever has been or will be. There's no geological survey technique nor carbon dating method that can put a timescale on God, who is from everlasting to everlasting.

But this is more than theological assertion. It's the foundation upon which we can have confidence to trust that God stands above the shifting sands of time, above the movement of tectonic plates and the rising and falling of great mountain ranges and, if that, then also above the circumstances of our particular time and place.

To put it another way, in God we have THE Rock of Ages — One for whom 'a thousand years are as a passing day.' Isn't this good to know — to be reminded of — when there's so much uncertainty in our country and across the world right now? Isn't it a cause for hope to know that even though so much seems to have been shaken to the core, our Rock, is from age to age the same? Covid-19 has done its worst and continues to wreak havoc, but we have a God who remains.

All of this is core to Christian belief and yet God's forever-ness stands so starkly against our own frailty and mortality. And if we were in any doubt about that, the last six months have served as a forceful reminder of it, and of the associated pain and suffering.

The Psalmist is entirely up-front about all of this. Verses 5-6 speak of we humans as being as grass which springs up in the morning, blooms and flourishes, and is withered and gone by the evening. And in verse 10 we read:

'Seventy years are given to us! Some even live to eighty. But even the best years are filled with pain and trouble; soon they disappear, and we fly away.'

Among the many hurts that Covid-19 has inflicted, there have been few more heart-rending scenes than those of relatives outside care homes, unable to visit loved ones. And of course care homes were at the epicentre of vulnerability in terms of 'at risk' members of our communities.

Our CrossReach care homes were not exempt from any of this. Some of them experienced tragic losses. Frailty and vulnerability were never felt more acutely. And yet the staff in our homes never flinched, never thinking about themselves at the expense of those in their care – those they loved and continue to love. Many staff members contracted the virus, as in those early days it was circulating unseen.

Here is the critical truth in all of this. Though God stands outside of time and space – 'from beginning to end, You are God' – God chooses to enter into our experience, such is God's love for us. And we see that loving and caring being expressed in the sacrificial service of our CrossReach staff, and of course many others.

And so it becomes clear that we are not in fact 'insignificant' at all. Our value in God's sight is inestimable and we give expression to that as we care for others, not least the weakest and most vulnerable members of our communities.

Today we give thanks for the work of CrossReach. But might it also be a moment in which you ask, 'Are there ways in which I can express something of God's care for those around me?'

PRAYERS

Because You care, Lord, we too will care. Some say, 'I couldn't care less.' We say, 'we couldn't care more.' Loving Lord, that You do care for us is beyond debate. On every page of scripture, we hear the reassuring whisper that You care – that You always have and always will. And so, reassured in that truth, send and equip us to be bearers of Your care in the world around us.

Today we thank You for CrossReach and for the care and compassion that informs all that it does. Hear us as we pray everyone at Crossreach as they seek to plan, to resource, to manage, to inspire and to encourage. Grant them all necessary wisdom to lead in these most challenging of circumstances.

Hear us as we pray for all team members charged with frontline service delivery – that Christ might use their hands and their hearts as they offer help, support and a willingness to listen.

Hear us as we pray for those who experience the care that CrossReach offers: from elderly residents of care homes, to those struggling with emotional wellbeing, poor mental health or addiction, to children and families facing educational and disability challenges.

Loving God, through the work of CrossReach might Your name be known more widely and Your compassion experienced more closely. In Jesus' name, we pray, Amen
