## The Lord's Prayer

Bible Reading: Mark 9:38-50

#### **Another Exorcist**

John said to him, 'Teacher, we saw someone casting out demons in your name, and we tried to stop him, because he was not following us.' But Jesus said, 'Do not stop him; for no one who does a deed of power in my name will be able soon afterwards to speak evil of me. Whoever is not against us is for us. For truly I tell you, whoever gives you a cup of water to drink because you bear the name of Christ will by no means lose the reward.

#### Temptations to Sin

'If any of you put a stumbling-block before one of these little ones who believe in me, it would be better for you if a great millstone were hung around your neck and you were thrown into the sea. If your hand causes you to stumble, cut it off; it is better for you to enter life maimed than to have two hands and to go to hell, to the unquenchable fire. And if your foot causes you to stumble, cut it off; it is better for you to enter life lame than to have two feet and to be thrown into hell. And if your eye causes you to stumble, tear it out; it is better for you to enter the kingdom of God with one eye than to have two eyes and to be thrown into hell, where their worm never dies, and the fire is never quenched. 'For everyone will be salted with fire. Salt is good; but if salt has lost its saltiness, how can you season it? Have salt in yourselves, and be at peace with one another.'

#### **Brief Reflection**

Whoever is not against us is for us. Making common cause with people who do not share our faith, or our culture, or our political views, can be challenging. Accepting that people who are not part of 'our' group can lead us to think in terms of 'them' and 'us', and a desire to maintain some form of ideological or theological purity.

What Jesus says is that even those who are not part of our group, or movement, or church, can nevertheless be with us in our endeavour to make the world a better place and to improve the lives of all the world's peoples.

Faced with the urgency of the climate situation we are in now, we could all learn to set aside our differences, and seek instead the common ground and shared purpose of all who wish to see change in the attitude and behaviour of governments, industries, and communities throughout the world. Equally, the voice of the Church can be a powerful witness and encouragement to those of all faiths and none who feel that they are in an uphill struggle and in a race against time.

Equally, children (here 'little ones', and it is clear from the context that Jesus is referring to those like the child who He has held in His arms, telling His disciples that when they welcome a child like this, they welcome Jesus Himself) feature regularly in the gospels as an example of the values of the kingdom of God. The first are last, and the last first; the great of the world become the least and the least become the great. Elsewhere, Jesus will tell the same disciples that they must be as accepting and trusting as a little child, if they are to see that kingdom.

The example set for us is for every area of life: what the world so often holds dear is counted of little significance with God, and vice versa. The way in which people and nations are driven to compete for a greater share of creation's wealth is destructive of the very creation on which we all depend. The ambitions of businesses to profit from their exploitation of finite natural resources too often leads to environmental degradation and disregard for the value of human life. Only the surrender of self, and of the struggle for personal or national advantage at the expense of others, will lead to a right stewardship of creation, such that it will continue to bless and enrich the lives of generations yet to come.
