Dear All,

Where were you on the 25 May Let me give you a hint! It 1954? was a Saturday, the same Saturday Scotland warmed up for their first ever World Cup finals by beating 2-1 in Helsinki. Finland and hopefully they will do as well if not better in the Euros this summer, but back home in Longstone away from all of that national excitement, a crowd of worshippers gathered in what was then a field with a hut. They watched the Moderator of the General Assembly, the Right Rev E.D. Jarvis DD, lay the foundation

stone of a new Hall-Church that would replace the old hut used by the translating Slateford church and the Longstone community. Buried behind the stone were coins minted for the Coronation of Queen Elizabeth II along with a history of Slateford Church the forerunner of Slateford Longstone Church. These 70 years have seen the post war pre-fabs become avenues of brick houses, the saplings become trees, the community become what it is today, with the church still present alongside and within its parish. There is much to be learned from the history of our church and its relationship with the With the church community. originally at the centre of a young growing community, and its membership reflecting that growth and connection as it rose from 500 to over 800 in a short space of time. But now 70 years on, the same

church is on the fringe of the community and largely bypassed as becomes Scotland increasingly of secular with 51.1% the population claiming no allegiance to any religion at all, a massive increase from the last census. То trace the cause of this, one can refer to Callum Brown's "The Death of Christian Britain" or the very readable "Finding Our Voice" by Rev Neil Glover but the challenge to all of us is to rediscover the spirit of 70 years ago that enabled a church in Slateford to respond to the challenges it faced then as people became disconnected from local churches who then had to find new of reconnecting and ways representing the Gospel to them.

That's our challenge!

# END OF PLACEMENT (ALMOST)

G reetings to friends at Slateford Longstone! I cannot believe my time at Slateford Longstone is nearly over as I will finish my formal placement at the end of June. This was my first of two placements that I need to undertake as part of my training, with a third probation year further down the road. You have been my guinea pigs so thank you for bearing with me as I have found my feet.

Some of my highlights include the two series of All Age talks I did – art work during Advent and Scottish people called overseas to serve God during Lent. It was interesting to find relevant pictures and people; to learn about them and then share some of the story with you all. As a wee reminder here is "The Annunciation" by John Collier which we looked at in December



And the Brough family who are working in Malawi and are Mission Partners of the Church of Scotland. Do support them in your prayers.



I found doing an All Age talk that inspired adults but was accessible to children challenging. I am grateful for Sam for pushing me to think about how I do this. Overflowing joy demonstrated with cocoa pops causing mess! I hope this gave child and adult alike a sense of the excitement and joy that the disciples felt as they experienced the risen Christ appearing to them when they were locked in the upper room, fearful of what might happen next.

How are your sunflowers doing? Ours are growing, slowly!



Contributing to worship on Easter morning was definitely a highlight. To move from the gloom of Good Friday and EVIL WON to the reversal of the resurrection morning and the invitation to NOW LIVE. Hallelujah!

It has been a privilege to contribute to worship most weeks, and especially to lead full services. As part of my placement agreement with the Church of Scotland Training team I needed to lead at least 3 full services, and this is likely to be part of my role when I qualify as an Ordained Local Minister (OLM) in a couple of years' time. As well Sunday mornings, as Т accompanied Sheila on a couple of visits which found pastoral L interesting, and I have observed Sam conducting funerals. I felt especially privileged to contribute through a reading and prayer to Patsy Riddoch's funeral. I still have much to learn in both pastoral visiting and preparing and delivering funeral services, but it has been good to gain this initial experience.

Before Christmas I also enjoyed engaging with the young folk at Messy Church, and contributing to the Nativity Play that the group put on – as a Shepherd (of course!). I was unable to continue with this commitment from the start of 2024 as I needed to receive medical treatment on Friday afternoons which clashed with Messy Church time. This is also why my placement was extended through to the end of June. I am so grateful for Sam's support whilst I have been receiving treatment; for accepting me as a student; for encouraging and challenging me as I contribute to worship; and getting enthusiastic about some of my essay subjects which inspired me to push forward and get them written!

Did I say essays? The other major part of my training is the academic study. It was hard to return to study but I have found it stimulating (most of the time) and I have successfully completed and passed all my year one courses. I have one more year of part time study to complete the required Certificate of Theology.

Last but not least, you! Thank you for shared conversations over coffee or lunch; for little words of encouragement that have meant a lot to me; for welcoming me into your church family. As you continue to think how to be disciples for Christ in Longstone, and in your own circles of friendship, extend that spirit of welcome and inclusion so that all have a sense of belonging and being a loved member of God's family.

May you each continue to know Christ's loving presence in your lives; may God be your Rock when times are hard; and may the Holy Spirit fill you with joy and peace.

ine walkers set out from Balerno to walk to raise funds for Christian Aid by walking over seven miles to Saughton Park Gardens. Two others joined us along the way. The sun shone and we all enjoyed the sunshine, and the picnic at the end. We have raised £1385 online and using sponsor sheets, and are very grateful to all who sponsored us. We have collected a further £300 through church and house to house collections, with more to come in.



Christian Aid's theme for 2024 is Act on Poverty.

Poverty pushed Aline to the brink of survival. She felt the full force of extreme poverty when an early marriage ended in abuse and violence. Separated from her six children, she was forced to sleep on the streets of Barundi. No home. No healthcare. No security.

But she was determined to push back against the inhumanity of poverty, driven by hope, faith and the love of her children. She transformed her life with help from Christian Aid. She started by participating in a transforming 3 day workshop, funded by Christian Aid. "The trainer restored a sense of hope and energy in me" she said. She was taught how to form a Village Savings and Loans Association and establish a steady income. These Associations enable people to save for the future, and borrow some money to kickstart small rural businesses. With all she had learned, Aline's dream of getting her children back finally felt possible. With a small start up loan, she started to trade avocados and peanuts locally. With her profits, she bought a bicycle so she was able to go to markets further afield. Her hard work paid off and she was able to rent a house and get her three eldest sons back. She still hopes to get her three youngest children back.

This is just one woman's story of poverty and how it nearly ruined her and her family's lives. Christian Aid steps in wherever possible to help people turn their lives around for the better. Not just by giving them money, but by teaching them and enabling them to build up their lives and to be lifted out of poverty.

This is where our Christian Aid donations go, on projects like Aline's.

## Message from Ruth:-

After her passing, I realise mum had had something in common with Slateford Longstone Church – her support of Blythswood Trust. Folk in the church and community do an amazing job supporting Blythswood's Christmas Shoebox Appeal, resulting in a large number of Christmas wrapped shoe boxes full of small gifts being sent abroad to children and adults who might not otherwise receive a gift at Christmas time. Mum had rheumatoid arthritis and unfortunately in her early fifties developed severe deformity of both hands though still retaining function in her thumbs and a finger of each hand. She prided herself that she could do everything, as due to the function in her thumbs she had 'her grip' and took pleasure in regularly demonstrating this to the family. She was never thought of as having a disability. However, the thing she couldn't do was knit. This was a loss to mum, who was a native Shetlander and knitting had been the warp and weft of her life from a young age.

However, mum was feisty and had a care for people. In her sixties she, along with my dad, set up a 'friendship group' in a local church, seeing a need in their particular community. An offshoot of this group was mum's band of knitters, older ladies who enjoyed knitting at home, mainly beautiful baby clothes and blankets. Mum's house became the collection point and every so often the 'Blythswood van' would arrive to pick up the black bags full of the items and transport them to their depot in Inverness.

So despite everything, mum managed to maintain her link with knitting, enjoyed communicating with the Blythswood folk and 'chatting with her knitters'.
