Dear Friends,

am writing this letter in the awareness that 701 Slateford Longstone Christmas Shoeboxes are now in transit from Scotland to wartorn Ukraine, where Christmas I imagine, will be observed under the painful loss of life, emotional trauma, and the devastation that accompanies war.

Wondering what a traditional Ukrainian Christmas might be like I stumbled upon the 2022 Christmas Issue of The Big Issue, and an article from a Ukrainian journalist Olena Skachko, who spoke to fellow refugees and asked about Christmas back home in Ukraine. From her article I learned that Ukraine at the time celebrated Christmas on the 6<sup>th</sup> and 7<sup>th</sup> January and that food was very important.

"They set the table, where there must be 12 lean dishes, which symbolise the 12 apostles or 12 months. Dishes prepared for Christmas Eve that I cook every year include: kutya, uzvar (a dried fruit drink), cabbage rolls, pickled mushrooms, beans, pancakes. herring in oil with onion, stewed cabbage with mushroom, a pickled cucumber salad or cabbage and onions, pirozhki with cabbage, pears and doughnuts. As you see, all 12 meals are without meat. The main dish on our table is kutya. It's boiled wheat with honey, poppy seeds, nuts and raisins. In old times on Christmas Eve people only ate this dish, but on the next day the fast is finished so you could eat everything you want."

But since December 2022 the war has changed things on the ground. The Ukrainian government have changed the date of Christmas to 24<sup>th</sup> and 25<sup>th</sup> December aligning it with the Gregorian Calendar and the rest of the Western world. Secondly, many families are torn apart and separated by the war and food, so much at the centre of things, is in shorter supply. Things are harder than before and we long and pray for a peaceful end to the war and a new era of freedom for the people.

But perhaps its into this situation that the message of Christmas is even more relevant than ever before, for it was into the midst of a people who had been invaded and conquered that Jesus came. The Prince of Peace was birthed into a place oppressed and ravaged by decades and centuries of invasions. The Assyrians, the Babylonians, the Persians, the Greeks/Egyptians, the Romans, one invasion after another. And into the midst of this Jesus brought what Jesus brings, namely, the energy to rise and transcend hardship in faith, hope and love; the awareness of God who never leaves us even in the darkest of times; the deep consciousness that there is meaning to be found in everything and in every moment and finally the reality of a Saviour who is Good News to all who will believe. This Advent and Christmas we will enlarge on these four components of Jesus coming amongst us as captured by the four Gospel writers, Mark, Matthew, John and Luke.

Join us as people across the world in all its complexities, remember His Coming.

By the time you read this, 701 of our shoe boxes will be on their way to Ukraine. The team are constantly delighted with how much you all get involved. We are a close team of 6 who quite understand that all this wouldn't be possible if it weren't for the congregation, family and friends who continually support us.

There are knitters, wrappers, buyers, donators and general supporters who put in a massive effort which lets us fill all those boxes.

We never try to beat previous years because even if we send 100 boxes, that is 100 children that receive a wonderful, thought-filled box of treats and essentials. That said, with the way the cost of living keeps going up, we never thought we would be able to match last year, let alone increase it.

Each box needs £3.00 towards postage and we are delighted that for the first time we raised enough money for all the boxes through our two coffee mornings, a car boot sale and lots of donations. What a great accomplishment. Some people spend a lot of time but others have really busy lives and want to hand in donations instead, we frequently receive donations of 10 bars of soap, a pack of pencils or 5 toothbrushes so here is a list of items that we like to include in every box if you want some ideas: Hat/Scarf/Gloves, Underwear, Toys including dolls, cars, skipping ropes, dominoes, puzzles, bat and ball, travel board games, play doh etc., Soft Toy, Notepad, Crayons/Pens, Filled Pencil Case, Soap/Facecloth, Toothpaste, Toothbrush, Comb/Brush, Sweets, Tennis Ball, Hand Puppet, Knitted Knitted handbag/purse... the list could go on.

An appeal to the knitters - we receive beautiful, knitted items, most of which are hats. We currently have 245 hats needing a scarf and gloves and 119 hats with scarves that need gloves. That is a lot of scarves and gloves so it would be much appreciated if you were to knit gloves and scarves before hats. We understand not everyone is skilled at knitting gloves so if you want something easier then we ran out of pencil cases, bags and hand puppets so they would be most welcome. But above all, a massive thank you to all those who hand in knitting, we know how much time you spend. We also know that a lot of you have started for next year already.

As if we weren't busy enough with our own shoe boxes, we were again a drop-off station; people from other churches, schools and organisations or just people doing it on their own were able to deliver shoe boxes to us. We were open for deliveries from 10am until 4pm on the first two Saturdays in November and spent the days checking through each box adding items and literature then taping them and putting into cardboard boxes ready for collection from Blythswood. We received over 400 boxes this year. This also wouldn't be possible without the volunteers, most of whom stayed with us the whole day.

We haven't set our calendar for next year yet but timings will be roughly the same; Coffee mornings in March and September, monthly nights May to wrapping Julv. packing on Thursday evenings from September and checking on the first two weekends in November. Firm dates will be advertised in Kirk News, so put the dates in your diaries and come along to help this great venture; Sarah and Carol make a lovely cup of tea.

The team are immensely grateful for the support we receive. We really couldn't do what we do without you.
